PRINCIPAL CONNECT

Welcome to the first edition of our revamped newsletter which will be distributed at the end of each term. I have had many positive comments from our primary parents to our class dojo where they welcome the regular messaging as well as the point in time photos and comments of the learnings and happenings in their child's class. Our College calendar is available on the website as well as through Parent Lounge (which has a bit more detail). Where we can, we attach to the calendar entry details of the activity. Our facebook page has also been warmly received and those of us who are not facebook users have signed up just to keep in touch with the Trinity community. Note that our PTFA runs a separate Deutschfest facebook page and Pelican Kids also have their own separate page. I invite feedback from our parent community on any of these channels of communication as we are always seeking to continuously improve in this vital area.

Our College Council will focus this year on enrolment growth strategies with the goal of ensuring that Trinity is the school of choice in Mildura and identifying our market edge. One strand of the strategy is to investigate the introduction of the International Baccalaureate (IB) Primary Years Program (PYP) and Middle Years Program (MYP). We are currently in the feasibility stage and on Monday 20th March held an important parent information session that outlined the benefits and the challenges of the IB programs and sought parent feedback on where they believe we currently are in key IB areas. Our students live in a complex world where learning and development arise not only from the school environment but also from family and home and the surrounding community. It is vital that the College captures and encourages an active learning environment through its curriculum. Adopting the PYP and the MYP would be a significant step in moving towards an internationally recognised standard as well as providing our students with a global perspective which will prepare them for playing their part on the world stage. The IB authorisation and evaluation process means that the College's programs and teaching methodologies are audited against internationally established benchmarks. The PYP and MYP provides an excellent vehicle for the delivery of the Australian curriculum and capabilities, whilst at the same time providing students with a unique global outlook as well as providing subject depth and breadth. The students would follow a balanced curriculum that is globally significant and provides them with the opportunity to take an active role in their own learning. At Trinity Lutheran College we would have a curriculum model that delivers core knowledge, understandings, skills and capabilities to our students, required by the Australian Curriculum but within an internationally benchmarked framework of learning. Being an IB World School would mean that we are committed to quality education, the professional development of our staff and equipping our students with the knowledge and skills for a rapidly changing world. Stay tuned for more parent and community information sessions as we explore this exciting program for our College.

Like a pinch of salt dropped in boiling water, the Word of God is a power that permeates the world. Lives touched by this word are transformed. Societies are transformed. Symbols, myths and celebrations may retain their outward forms but their meaning is transformed. We see this clearly in our Easter symbols today. CONNECTING TO PATHWAYS



At Trinity we strive to provide a variety of pathways opportunities for our students, particularly in the two years leading to their transition into a post Trinity education. We believe that our program provides opportunities and helps solidify student pathways to achieve success in their chosen careers.

Students who wish to undertake a traditional trade program are able to begin their first year of a Certificate II course at one of the Mildura Region Trade Training Centre campus' or Sunraysia Institute of TAFE. Students who are ready to commence VCE study can enroll in a single subject at Mildura Senior College. In 2017 we have approximately 60% of our year 10 population undertaking an off campus Pathways program in addition to their year 10 subjects at Trinity.

Students who are enrolled in a VET certificate program make the commitment to study their chosen course for one day a week at their designated institution. We currently have five students at the Deakin TTC either studying Certificate II in Automotive or Building & Construction, two students at Riverside TTC studying Beauty or Kitchen Operations and 12 students at TAFE undertaking Integrated Technologies, Engineering or Allied Health.

Students studying a VCE subject commit to travelling to Mildura Senior College three times a week to attend classes whilst ensuring that they also continue to keep up with their year 10 studies. Students will also complete an exam at MSC as part of their program. This year we have 10 students studying Biology, Further Mathematics or Computing.

PREP CONNECT



Prep students got up close and personal with some of the local wildlife this term. As part of their unit “Staying Alive” which looks at the needs of living things, Sara Holmes from *EnviroEdu* brought lizards, snakes, turtles and sugar gliders in to the classroom. The students had the opportunity to interact with and observe these beautiful creatures first hand. The students had many questions to ask about the various animals and learnt about their needs, the importance of habitat and the risks posed by feral animals. Holding a Murray Darling carpet python and patting a sugar glider will no doubt be among the highlights of the year.

PARTNERS IN PRINT is a highly valued literacy program offered to our Prep families. Students and their parents engage in rotational interactive activities where they learn about and practice the same strategies their child's teacher uses in the classroom to teach reading, writing and spelling skills. Partners in Print prepares and empowers parents to support their children to become successful readers and writers at home. It is always wonderful to see so many of our families engaging in this program, particularly our dads.



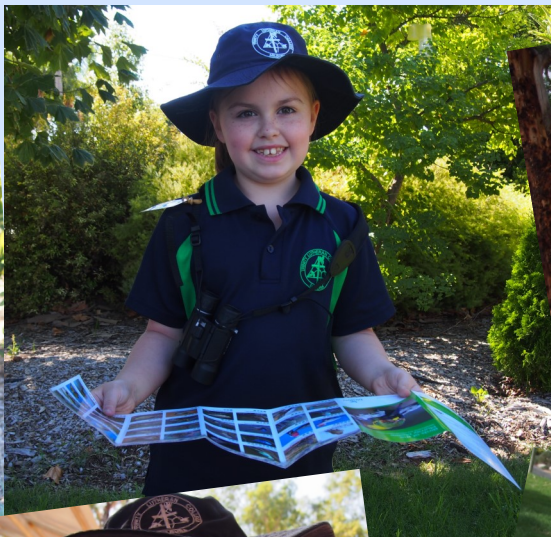
CONNECTING WITH INQUIRY

“Welcome to my home – the Mallee! It’s a pretty special place”.

Year 1 and 2 students have been learning about the six nationally threatened bird species from the Murray Mallee region and their environment. Our three classes identify themselves as the Regent Parrots, Malleefowls and the Mallee Emu-Wrens. Bird watching in our own school backyard with binoculars borrowed from Mildura Birdlife helped students to explore the big questions: What makes a place special? How do we care for places?

Jayna Podgorski from Mildura Birdlife was our guest speaker who shared her love of birds and God’s creation. As Christians we believe that God has given us the responsibility to care and respect His creation. Students gained an understanding of indigenous connection to place. They also created a midjer (basket). The amazing malleefowl story tells of a threatened species that has an intriguing way of incubating their eggs. Through dance and drama the story of the malleefowl came to life. Students integrated their understanding into mathematics by building a nesting mound in the sandpit. The musical habitats game highlighted the many threats (scenario cards) that impact the Mallee birds’ survival. The newspaper represented the bushland. The students’ were the Mallee birds. Students used think, pair, share to talk about the game and ideas it generated.

To culminate their learning, students visited Hattah Lakes, thanks to the sponsorship of the Mallee Catchment Management Authority. They participated in bird watching, being a wildlife detective and doing a bug blitz.



CONNECTING WITH INQUIRY

Albert Einstein famously stated that 'imagination can lead to an endless supply of possibilities'. At Trinity we explicitly teach numeracy and literacy, yet also focus on skilling students with the ability to think creatively and imaginatively, the key to success in the ever-changing 21st Century world.

It has been an out of this world term so far in the Hawthorn learning community. As part of our 'How the world works' inquiry focus we have been learning about space. One area of interest identified by students was space travel. Students researched the history of space travel and vehicles which travel in space. A Trinity parent, Daryle Oldham, then visited the class to offer his perspective on how planes are built. This began to develop students' understanding of the aerodynamics of flying vehicles.

We then investigated the design cycle, and used this, coupled with our knowledge of drag, range and wind resistance, to prototype and build a rocket. Using a teacher built rocket launcher, students were able to launch their rockets up to 90 metres. The students gathered data on the length travelled, hang time and velocity of their rockets and graphed this data. It was exciting for students to utilise their maths skills in a real life way. This analysis then allowed students to re-design their rocket to create a different, faster and further travelling iteration.

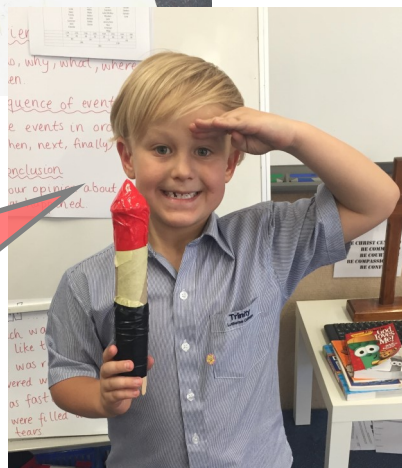
Students have identified an interest in Mars exploration. The next step for our class is to create and code mars rover robots to add as a payload to the rockets.

It has been a thrilling term in which students have used the knowledge they discovered to design, build and launch their rockets. Students have enjoyed the opportunity to apply their learning in an authentic, fun way.



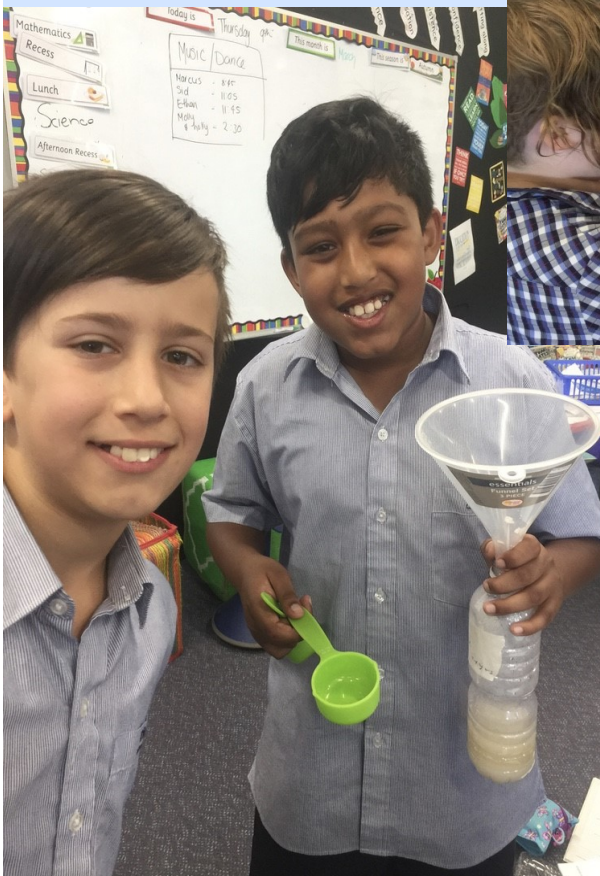

We engaged in discussions and demonstrated our understanding of microorganisms and the role they play in our world. We worked collaboratively in teams to prepare a report on the role of microorganisms in our lives and then presented these findings to our class.

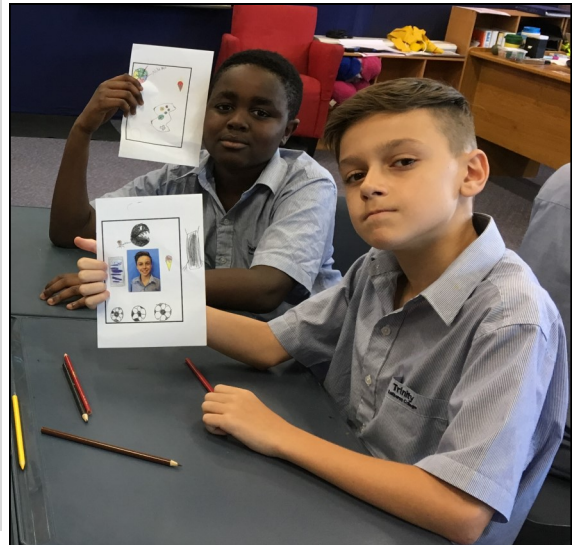

START RIGHT MAKING CONNECTIONS

START RIGHT is our pastoral care program with a focus on student well-being that is implemented at Trinity Lutheran College across the primary learning communities at the beginning of each year. Students participate in a range of activities across the week with their classroom teacher with the aim of building positive relationships, establishing routines and setting high expectations to create a safe, positive learning environment. A diversity of activities have been designed to support students in creating a sense of belonging, to get to know each other and show pride in each other's accomplishments.

START RIGHT involves students commencing our social and emotional skills building program "You Can Do It" and exploring the program's foundational keys to success. Students also revisit our whole of college core values to deepen their level of ownership and commitment toward them. Our Start Right program concluded on the Friday with a variety of novelty team building games that celebrated a successful start to the new school year.

CONNECTING WITH BUDDIES



The buddy program in our primary school aims to give the older students in our primary community the opportunity to look after and care for smaller, more vulnerable children who are in the foundation years of their schooling. Buddies enables younger children to feel safe and cared for while the older children feel valued and respected. Our buddy program strengthens the whole school community, whilst teaching important social skills. Year 5 students buddy with prep and the year 6 students buddy with year 1's, often continuing with the same buddy relationship. Our younger students know that they have a fellow student they can confidently turn to for support. Friendships are also created, increasing the likelihood of more positive school behaviour for all students.



LAUNCHING THE RITE JOURNEY

The Rite Journey (TRJ) is a unique educational programme designed for year 9 boys and girls which supports the development of self-aware, engaged, responsible and resilient young adults. The year-long programme is designed to help with the transition to being grown up. The Rite Journey provides our emerging young men and women with the opportunity to experience rites of passage and important life lessons, created and facilitated by our caring guides (teachers) and significant adult mentors. A unique feature of The Rite Journey is the seven steps that form a contemporary Rite of Passage. The TRJ team at Trinity have created a special and memorable series of events, aimed at honouring each young person's transition into adulthood. Parents and carers are encouraged to be involved in some of these ceremonies and share this part of their child's journey.

Underpinned by a strong Christian focus and worldview and customised to reflect the needs of students at Trinity, the program provides a safe environment where students within their gender groups and together with their teachers, examine and discuss the complexities of becoming young adults in a sometimes confusing world, but also face physical challenges to develop persistence and resilience. The students undoubtedly benefit from the frank and sometimes challenging aspects of the program which looks at relationships with self, others and God. The involvement and input of parents and mentors as positive and proactive role models also plays a major role in the success of the journey.



LAUNCHING SPORTS EXCELLENCE PROGRAM

Trinity has launched a Sports Excellence Program for students from years 5 to year 10 who specifically want to improve their skills in volleyball (boys and girls) or soccer (girls). Students receive expert coaching by experienced and qualified trainers. Currently there are 3 girls involved in the soccer program and 12 students involved in the volleyball program. For 90 minutes a week the students are involved in structured programming aimed at developing their skills and techniques associated with their sport, as well as team plays, structures and an overall solid understanding of the game. This is a year long program where students can enter or leave at the start of each term only. It is anticipated that these students will become the backbone of our teams in interschool as well as local competitions.



LUNCHTIME ACTIVITIES

FUSE

FUSE is the name for a vibrant group of youth pastors and workers from some of our local churches. They come each Thursday lunchtime to hang out and build relationships with the year 5 to 10 students. The Link has been a popular venue with computer games, board games and other fun activities taking place. FUSE is also found out at the downball courts, basketball courts or on the hockey field playing a variety of fun games.



Anyone for chess?

As part of encouraging students in all aspects of learning through a variety of extra-curricular activities, Trinity holds Chess club every Tuesday lunch time. All students are welcome to attend regardless of their experience or ability. We are very fortunate to have two parents who are experienced chess players who come in each week to advise students as they play games and to give them hints and tips. The atmosphere is one of fun, respect and acceptance with a slightly competitive feeling from some of the older students.

Our chess club students are then able to participate in local, state and national competitions including one that we recently hosted at Trinity. Around 140 students from 8 different schools competed in three levels of competition: Primary (years 1-6), Middle Years (years 5-9) and Open (years 7-10). Once again Trinity had a very successful day with our primary group coming third overall and Siddharth Rachakonda achieving the second highest score for the primary competition. Amon Treloar, in his first competition, came ninth which was a fantastic effort.

In the middle years group, the Trinity team came second with only half a point separating us from the top spot which qualifies us for the state final at the end of the year. Our best performers for this group were Aadyn Healy who came second, Luke MacKay who came fourth and Costa Tryfonopoulos who came sixth. In the open section we were feeling the loss of some of our year 10's from last year but nonetheless we managed to field a very competitive team. Trinity came second in the open level with Rahul Hariprakash taking out first place for the highest score having won all of his games. Our next highest ranking player was Thomas Morrison who came seventh.

The theme for the day was “My Favourite Things” which was reflected in our Chapel, classroom activities and a singalong. 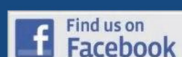
