Dear parents and friends of the Trinity community

It is hard to believe that we are at the end of term 3. It has been an activity packed time for many of our students and we are all looking forward to a two week break. CAMP CONNECT Year 3



Year 3 Camp at Lake Cullulleraine had it all, from laughs to macroinvertebrates. The three days in September were packed with fun and learning. We began at the Pioneer Village in Millewa, learning about historical life and schooling. Upon arrival at Lake Cullulleraine we took the first of many hikes around the lake. We then had a very special visit from Susan Saris from the Mallee Catchment Management Authority who came and spoke to about the positive outcomes river regulation has provided our community including water for farms and urban use.

Next we got our hands dirty by sampling the water at Lake Cullulleraine. Using nets, we collected sediment samples from the bottom of the lake and analysed them, discovering many different macroinvertebrates, including the unusual caddisfly which builds it's shell out of sticks. The yabbing tradition continued and we were lucky enough to catch two shrimp! Amongst the learning there was time for games, a talent show and lots of footy. We completed the trip with a visit to Buronga Botanic Gardens. According to all of the students and teachers, Lake Cullulleraine camp was #somuchfun!



CAMP CONNECT Year 5



The year 5 students had a very exciting time on their camp at Ballarat. We explored Sovereign Hill, swim, enjoyed a pantomime and took part in our very own Red Faces. A highlight was when we stepped back in time, experiencing how school was in the 1850's. We all sat mesmerised by the Blood on the Southern Cross Show. It was awesome! We did some gold panning and watched gold being smelted and poured. On the last day we visited the graves of historical figures and saw the Eureka flag at the Museum of Democracy Eureka built on the site of the battlefield.



CAMP CONNECT Year 6



The year 6 students travelled to Melbourne for their annual camp. We visited the MCG. The next day was a morning at the Melbourne Museum followed by having fun exploring Scienceworks and a ferry ride back on the Yarra. This was an eye-opening experience. We proudly wore our school uniform and explored Parliament House. We then visited the Immigration Museum. Dinner that night was at the Queen Victoria Market where we watched the Fire and Light Show. Before heading back home, we spent some time exploring the Melbourne Zoo.

CONNECTING WITH SCIENCE

Science Week 14 September to 18 September



Testing PH levels

The students discovered how to check the PH from our fish tank in the library and in soft drink. They used the lemons from our garden with litmus paper, universal PH paper and a PH test strip. The fish tank had a PH Level of 7 and the soft drink had a PH level of 3.



Paper Chromatography

Students used different coloured textas and placed several different coloured spots on a roll of paper. It was then left on a plate with a layer of water. This experiment demonstrated how mixed colour ink can be separated and seen easily. The young scientists were supported by senior students.



Looking through a Stereo Microscope

How interesting the living things look under a microscope! Students used a stereo microscope which can show things 20 to 40 times larger to look at various objects. Students observed tiny pollens on top of flowers, hairs on insect's wings and legs and more!



ICAS COMPETITIONS 2017

65 students across all eligible year levels participated in the range of ICAS competitions this year. Trinity students continue to receive excellent results with a number of credit, distinctions and high distinctions being awarded.

In Digital Technologies, five students gained a distinction scoring in the top 10%: Siddharth Rachakonda, Nethika Wijekoon, Abhigyan Rashid, Jasmin Parniss and Elana Parnis.

In Science, five students gained a distinction scoring in the top 10%: William Cumming, James Morkos, Luke MacKay, Zoe Tonkin and Amelia Morrison. Credit students who scored in the top 30-10% were: Kade Ferguson, Siddharth Rachakonda, Nethika Wijekoon, Kavin Akilan, Thomas Morrison, Elana Parnis.

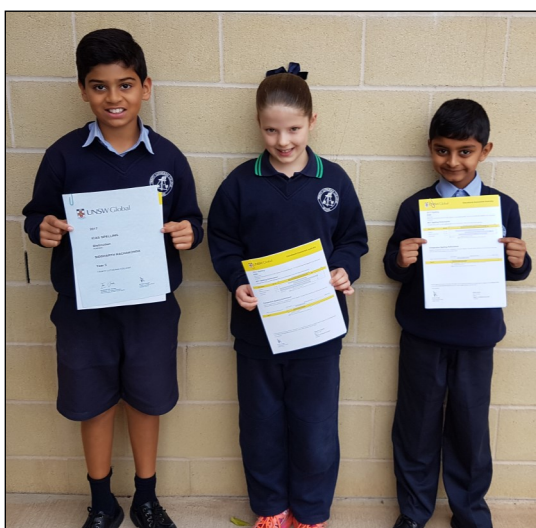

In English, which is primarily a reading comprehension exam, Amelia Morrison received a high distinction meaning that they scored in the top 1%. Statistics, statistics and more statistics!

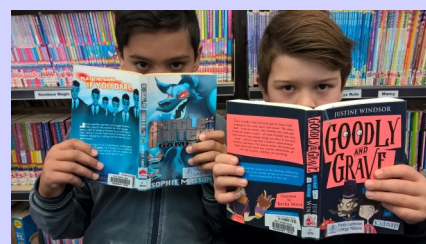
Statistics and statistical thinking have become increasingly important in a society that relies more and more on information and calls for evidence. Hence the need to develop statistical skills and thinking across all levels of education has grown and is of core importance in a century which will place even greater demands on society for statistical capabilities throughout industry, government and education. A natural environment for learning statistical thinking is through experiencing the process of carrying out real statistical data investigations from first thoughts, through planning, collecting and exploring data, to reporting on its features. Statistical data investigations provide ideal conditions for active learning, hands-on experience and problem-solving.

In the year 7 Maths unit on statistics, students were asked to generate a question. This question required them to collect data in order to generate and display a statistical analysis that may or may not have answered the question, but allowed them to pose a secondary question in which to further explore. It was great to see all students actively engaged in collecting data when given the flexibility of answering a question that they had ownership of. It required them to think further than the initial their final report. All students were required to make a range of connections with the world around them. They needed to think big picture.



PREMIERS READING CHALLENGE

The Premiers Reading Challenge has now closed. It began 13 years ago and since then more than 2.2million students have read almost 42 million books. This year was no exception. At Trinity we had 81 students complete this challenge and they read a total of 2567 books. The standout was Ella Rowe reading more than 100 books by herself and every single student in 3B completing the challenge.

Throughout Term 3, the Prep students have been studying fairy tales making connections across many curriculum areas. We have read them, listened to them, acted them out, conducted science experiments like growing “magic” beans, cooked, created art works, rewritten them in our own words and even completed maths tasks related to them.



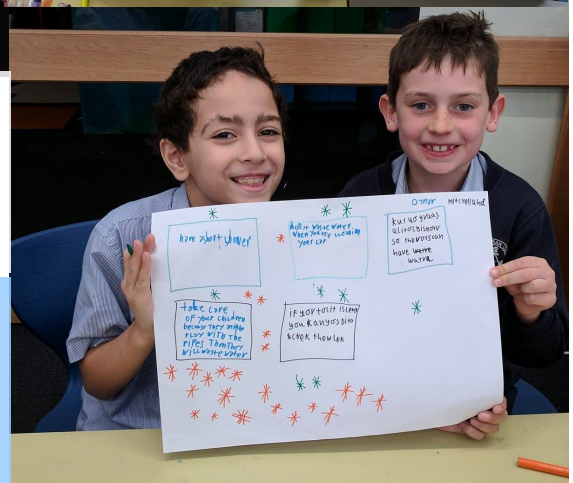
Literature conversations are a fabulous way to get students excited about reading and to talk on a deep and personal level. All that is needed is a book worth talking about, a group of students who have read the same book and allocated time to respond thoughtfully.

One of the reasons students love literature conversations is because they get to be heard. When teachers do most of the talking, we silence the voices of our students. In student-led literature conversations, students learn to take turns without having to raise their hand before speaking, listen more respectfully to others, develop new understandings and uncover deep layers of meaning.



During Book Week the prep to year 2 students experienced literacy learning by making treasure maps with Miss Tuffin, creating a maze with Miss Schache, learning about the origin of our name with Mrs Buffon, making a bicycle with Mr Nitschke and a sequencing task with Mrs Hornsby.

Incorporating literacy into the integrated studies program allows students to share their knowledge with others. As part of our learning during Water Week, we created *Water Wise* presentations to highlight some of the ways we can conserve the precious resource of water.

Engaging in Challenging Research

During Term 3, the year 4 students have been putting their literacy skills to good use while completing research challenges in both History and Science. Utilising the strategies of determining important ideas, synthesising information and recognising the author's intent, students have been able to successfully gather information and transform this into creative writing pieces and mini projects, which not only display their understandings, but also make their learning real. The students proudly presented their space project to their parents at a special presentation morning.



BOOK WEEK: Escape to Everywhere

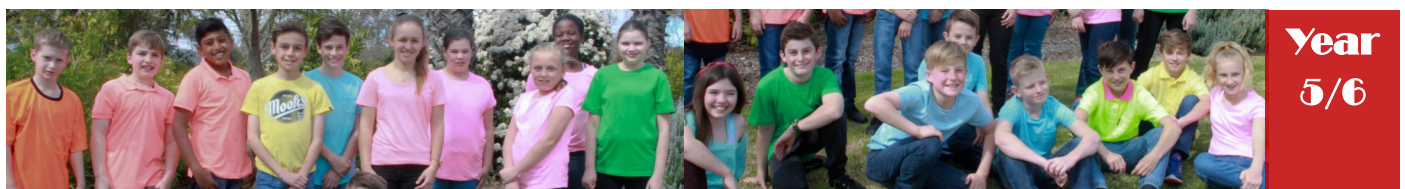
